Executive Mayor's Desk



The 2017/18 financial year just ended and we are starting the 2018/19 financial year with vigour. The Council passed the 2018/19 IDP and budget within the stipulated and legislated timeframes. It is a record milestone that Council should be proud of and work hard to maintain.

June is a month that South Africa commemorates the youth of 1976.

We have encountered a loss of one of our own icons a month before we celebrated June 16, the veteran and our struggle photo journalist - Sam Nzima who put Bushbuckridge and South Africa

at large on the world map by exposing the evil of apartheid.

It is now in the hands of the current youth to continue with the struggle to defend our hard earned democracy.

I urge young people to be serious and take education even more seriously. It is a powerful tool that can change their lives and the lives of those around them.

Let us use this youth month to honour the sacrifice of uTata Nelson Mandela and uMama Albertina Sisulu towards a free, non-racial and democratic South Africa. Let us fight to economically emancipate our youth and build an economy that is beneficial to everyone.

Bushbuckridge Promotes A Healthy Lifestyle

In promoting a healthy lifestyle amongst community members, the Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM) hosted a three in one (3 in 1) marathon at Ximhungwe Sports Ground on 23 June 2018.

The 3 in 1 marathon comprised of the following distance runs:

- 5km from Croquet lawn to Mathankeng
- 10km from MP stream to Gakopeng Bridge
- 21.1km from Thulamahashe to Ximhungwe Sports field.

The marathon started at 07H00am and attracted am-

ateurs and professional athletes within Bushbuckridge.

It was also opened to all age groups, from 15 to 70 years of age.

The marathon also included a 5km fun walk from Croquet lawn to Mathankeng.

A 74-year senior citizen defied all odds when he completed the 21.1km race.

Prizes were given to those who obtained position one (1) to four (4) in all the race categories.



Dwarsloop To Thulamahashe Road Gets a Face Lift

On 11 October 2017 the Department of Public Works in partnership with Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM) conducted a Sod-turning, at Buyisonto in preparation of the overhaul rehabilitation of the Dwarsloop to Thulamahashe Road - Phase A and B.


Currently, the road is getting refurbished and it is envisaged to be completed by November 2019.

The reconstruction of the road will cost the Department of Public Works, Roads

and Transport over R175 million.

The rehabilitation and refur-

bishment of this road will ensure that motorists drive in a smooth and safe environment.

The road is a major economic hub that is connected to the busy R40 road that links South Africa, Mozambique and Zimbabwe.

The road project has created the much needed temporary job opportunities for community members.

The Thulamahashe road was riddled with huge potholes and the municipality hopes the reconstruction will help reduce road carnages whilst promoting road safety.

Marite To Hoxane Road To Receive An Upgrade

There were ululations and excitement on 02 May 2018 when the MEC of Public Works, Roads and Transport Ms Sasekani Manzini accompanied by the Executive Mayor Cllr Sylvia Nxumalo unveiled the contractor appointed to upgrade the road between Marite via Goromani to Hoxani in a community meeting held at Shatlaleng sports ground.

The road upgrade between Marite and Hoxane will stretch from ward 1, 2, and 4 respectively - it is a 13.5 kilometres long road. It will cost the Public Works, Roads and Transport R176 million.

The project is envisaged to take 18 months to conclude with completion expected to be November 2019.

Community members have had difficulty driving through the gravel road during the rainy season.

Not only will the road upgrade improve the driving experience of community members, it will also create business and job opportunities for community members from the three (3) benefiting wards.

Local businesses will also benefit through sub-contracting and supply of materials.

Speaking at Shatlaleng Sportsground was the MEC of Public Works, Roads and Transport, Ms Sasekani Manzini where she assured community members that the contractor will build a high-quality road infrastructure that will last for 20 years.

The Executive Mayor welcomed the intervention by the Department of Public Works, Roads and Transport as a way of resolving road backlogs within the municipal area of jurisdiction.

The Mayor also made a clarion call for drivers to slow down and take precautionary measures during the construction period.

DHS Presents A Family of Physically Challenged Individuals With A New House



As part of celebrating freedom day, the Department of Human Settlement (DHS), Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM) and Disability People of South Africa (DPSA) gave back a family of 23 physically challenged individuals their dignity by officially handing over a newly and fully furnished house.

Handing over the keys to the elderly member who is blind, Gogo Kate Msimano, the Executive Mayor of BLM Cllr. Sylvia Nxumalo alluded that when the African National Congress (ANC) led government took over in 1994 vowed to strive for a better life for all and improve the living standards of ordinary South Africans.

'Not only are we as the government focusing on housing but rather all spheres of service delivery in the country, concluded the Executive Mayor Cllr.Sylvia Nxumalo.

The celebrations continued to the church where the Executive Mayor interacted with members of the community and delivered her keynote address.

She pleaded with members of the community to refrain from criminal activities including buying material meant for building RDP houses for the poor which often results in poor quality built houses.

Partaking in these kinds of criminal activities leaves the municipality in disarray in the community's perception, as the municipality takes the blame for poor workmanship. The Executive Mayor further urged members of the community to ensure that government should and

will account for every action including their own councillors. She again applauded the hard work displayed by the Community Development Workers (CDWs) in identifying the family. Their act is in line with the constitution's Bill of Rights as everyone has a right to a shelter.

Executive Mayor said, "I would like to ask the members of society to be patient with the three spheres of government (National, Provincial and the Municipality) in terms of delivery of services.

The municipality's eyes and ears are the CDWs, and the Ward Councillor as well as all other relevant stakeholders of the society. It is therefore imperative that the society follows all the necessary steps before engaging in any illegal community protests."

"Should at any given time not to be assisted from all the above stakeholders I have mentioned above, the Municipal Regional Office, Office of the Speaker and my Office are always open to serve the needs of the people.

The municipality is also on a drive campaign to ensure an improved standard of living. We will continue to work hand in hand with the DHS and all relevant stakeholders including our Local Councillors and CDWs and deliver decent houses and other services," continued the Executive Mayor.

She also handed over title deeds to gogo Lemita Malope and Lilly Malele. She alluded that a further 3700 houses will be delivered to the needy community members by the DHS.

Municipality Conducts Budget And IDP Roadshows

18-25 April 2018 were the dates set aside especially for the budget and Integrated Development Plan (IDP) public consultation roadshows in Maviljan Hall, Marriam Mogakane Community Hall, Margareth Manana Community Hall and Mkhuhlu Community Hall.

All the public consultation meetings were led by the Executive Mayor and chaired by the Council Speaker.

These roadshows are in line with the 1998 white paper on local government where it identified the IDP as a guiding tool for the development of local government and a yardstick for measuring development against the set objectives and the available budget.

Local government is the cold face sphere of service delivery and the main entry point of planning.

Section 152 of the Constitution of the Republic, 1996 stipulates that the responsibility of this sphere of the state is to provide a democratic and accountable government for local communities, to encourage the involvement of communities and its organisations in the matters of local government.

It is in accordance with these pieces of legislation that the municipality practised participatory democracy by involving the communities in developing the IDP and the budget through the budget consultative road shows.

The main objective of the IDP is to coordinate the work of local and other spheres of government in a coherent plan to improve the quality of life for all people living in an area.

It should take into account the existing conditions, problems and resources available for development.

The municipal IDP and budget will enable the Council and administration to speed up service delivery, guide development and efficient use of funds, redress the legacy of apartheid, strengthen democracy and promote co-ordination development between the municipality, district municipality and other sector departments.

The IDP as a municipal service delivery blueprint assists the municipality with its multi-year budgeting and planning.

The engagement of the communities through the public participation processes made sure that the voices of local people were heard and that their needs were prioritised and accommodated.

The BLM Executive Mayor, Members of the Mayoral Committee, Councillors, Acting Municipal Manager, Directors and Managers were part of the public consultation roadshows.



Bushbuckridge Local Municipality Holds LGNC Summit



From 22-23 May 2018, the Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM) hosted a Local Geographical Name Change (LGNC) Summit at the Gannet Place.

The main purpose of the summit was to educate ward committee members and representatives of traditional authorities about the procedures to be followed when naming and renaming streets, community halls, bridges sports ground, mountains and rivers.

The naming and renaming of streets is done to promote a common identity because most of the names are euro-centric.

The summit took the resolutions below:

· LGNC should be constitut-

ed in line with the legislative framework.

- LGNC should be a section 80 committee and chaired by either the MMC responsible or by the Council Speaker.
- Traditional Councils should serve as ex-official members on the LGNC.
- Ward for the LGNC should be established.
- An adequate budget must be set aside for LGNC.
- Introduce stipends for LGNC committee members.
- Public participation should be considered on all submitted names.
- All local stakeholders including organised formations to be thoroughly involved in the name and renaming processes.
- Names should be gazetted without delay.

Deputy Minister of Public Service And Administration Assesses **Service Delivery**

In a guest to assess service delivery and governance in public institutions as well as convening an engagement consultation under Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM), the Deputy Minister for Public Service and Administration, Dr Chana Pilane-Majake with the support of the Executive Mayor, Cllr Sylvia Nxumalo hosted a Service Delivery Imbizo.

The Service Delivery Imbizo was held on 08 June 2018 at Rolle Worshippers Church. Before interacting members of the community, the Deputy Minister and the Mayor conducted unannounced series of frontline service points.

They asked officials at the Thulamahashe Department of Home Affairs, Mhala SAPS and Rolle clinic to assess service delivery and take stock of the service delivery challenges.

Addressing members the community at the Imbizo venue, Dr Pilane-Majake

alluded that Godide High School was built using mud hence the appalling state and she said that the Department of Education has been made aware of the situation. On Rolle Bridge, the Deputy Minister said that the Department of Public Works has appointed a service provider to submit designs of the bridae.

In the same breath, she indicated that the Rolle-Manveleti road cannot be attended

to as the Department of Public Works did not allocate a budget for it in this financial year.



BLM Supports OVCs

In a bid to address the plight of Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC), Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM) hosted a summit for OVCs from 11-13 May 2018 at the OTJ Guest house.

The main purpose of the summit was to create an environment full of care, support and protection for orphans and vulnerable children in line with the Children's Act.

The summit was attended by 60 learners from schools that are experiencing a high rate of teenage pregnancy, drop-out and child-headed families.

The summit was so to address and curb some of the challenges that OVCs have to contend with on a daily basis such as poverty, substances abuse and teenage pregnancy.

Speaking at the summit was the MMC of Social Development, Cllr Krisjan Mokoena he urged the learners not to feel like outcasts due to their impoverished backgrounds, but to soldier on in pursuit of

better lives.

He told them that their future is not dependent on their current family status. "If your parents are not educated, it does not mean that you too will be uneducated," alluded the MMC.

He further urged academically excelling poor pupils to take advantage of the municipal bursary scheme, meant to help the poor and previously disadvantaged pupils to further their studies at various institutions of higher learning.

Commissions were established to address the issues which continue to rage teenage pregnancy, substance abuse and killing of the girl child.

The Executive Mayor Cllr Sylvia Nxumalo is calling upon community members to rally and protect OVCs and she expects the businesses to support them as well.

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) has an estimate of 153 million children worldwide who are orphans.



Acornhoek has the highest rate of crime in the Bushbuckridge area, in an attempt to tackle this issue, the Department of Community Liaison, Safety and Security (DCLSS) in partnership with the Bushbuckridge Local Municipality (BLM) and the South African Police Service (SAPS) hosted a safety Imbizo in Acornhoek, on 24 June 2018 at the Ehlanzeni TVET College (Mapulaneng Campus) Sports Field.

The participants were community members from wards which constitute and fall under Acornhoek region.

Speaking at the event was the Executive Mayor, Cllr Sylvia Nxumalo who pleaded with community members to refrain from barring pupils from going to school when they picket. She alluded that there are groups who barricade roads and demand money from motorists and keep burning down schools. She urged parents to report their children who come home with stolen goods to report them to the police, she believes that this will help reduce crime.

During the Imbizo, community members were given the opportunity to ask questions which were answered by Cluster Commander, Ms Mashele.

One community member when given the platform mentioned that, he opened a case of assault at the Acornhoek Police Station yet the perpetrator is freely roaming in the streets. Ms Mashele assured the community

member that, she will do everything humanly possible to ensure that the perpetrator faces the law.

Before delivering his keynote address the MEC of Community Liaison, Safety and Security, Hon Pat Ngomane thanked the members of the public for their honest comments and views regarding the state of affairs in Acornhoek and encouraged them to work hand in gloves with the Community's Police Forums and the SAPS.

He said that the government is committed to providing a safer environment to all citizens of this country and he urged community members to safeguard government's infrastructure by ensuring that they are not broken into and torched down by hooli-

gans

The MEC also took the opportunity to lash out at corrupt police officers who commit crimes. He assured members of the public that 90% of police officers are committed to creating safer environments in our communities.

"We need to go back to the culture and practices whereby when people come to our villages to seek refuge - the relevant tribal authority is engaged.

This is done to ensure that when those people commit crime, we are able to track them down and let the law take its course," concluded MEC Ngomane.
